Hence, we cannot afford to leave any child behind. It is our duty to ensure that all our learners, regardless of their socioeconomic background, have equal opportunities to acquire digital literacy.

We should make ours the conviction that it is primarily by bridging the digital divide that we can help create a society that thrives on inclusivity, empowerment, and innovation.

That has been central to the determination of my Ministry to implement such innovative measures as the Early Digital Learning Programme and the provision of internet connectivity for the primary subsector and the setting up of the Student Support Portal for secondary schools. These innovations, along with others, helped us make digital inroads in the world of education; they supported us well in coping with the impact of the pandemic and should be helpful in staring down future of potential crises.

At this stage, one cannot not speak of one of the most fascinating developments in recent years – namely, the rise of Generative Artificial Intelligence (AI) tools.

These tools have the potential to revolutionize the way we create, innovate, and express ourselves.

Generative AI tools, such as ChatGPT provide us with a new frontier of creativity, allowing us to explore ideas and possibilities that were previously unimaginable. They can be powerful allies in the pursuit of knowledge, self-expression, and problem-solving. AI, and chatbots like Chat GPT should rather be used to give a fillip to the creativity of learners. Thus, I am strongly in favour of using technology as a support in doing our work rather than using technology to do our work for us.

Yes, indeed, there are always associated risks.

UN Secretary General, Mr Antonio Guterres, recognised this when addressing a session devoted to the theme of Digital Transformation during the Transformative Education Summit in November last year. He trenchantly stated, ".... without guidance and guardrails [ digital technology has] a huge potential for harm"

Let us then recognise that, with great power comes great responsibility. It is crucial to approach the use of Generative AI tools with diligence and discernment. While these tools offer tremendous benefits, we must be mindful of using them in a <u>responsible</u> and <u>ethical</u> way.

Ladies and Gentlemen, dear Participants,

Today's ceremony must also be viewed through another prism.

We emphatically believe that boys and girls alike must have equal access to ICT tools and multimedia for their personal development. There is no better way to emphasize this than through a dedicated award ceremony that celebrates the achievements of both genders. By commemorating Girls in ICT Day and organizing a Boot Camp competition open to all, we are sending a powerful message of inclusivity and gender equality.

Let us continue to champion equal opportunities, empowering both our boys and girls with the tools they need to thrive in the digital age. After all, you, the young persons here present and your peers will be the ones responsible, tomorrow, for making effective the notion of ESG, ie, Environmental, Social Governance as well as enabling our future smart cities to go into hyper drive – and smart cities thrive on digitalisation, on IoT (Internet of Things) and the like.
