And therein lies a fundamental skill that you will have to depend upon as part of your growth-- the skill of generating ideas, identifying opportunities, and proposing creative solutions.

Another important lesson that you would have drawn by working on your project is that you have to bring value to whatever you undertake. You will agree that, if one embarks on an enterprise that ultimately brings or adds no value, there is absolutely not reason to engage in it.

But I would wish specially to highlight the one other skill that stresses the significance of **Teamwork**

I guess we all know the benefits arising from working in teams: mutual support and reinforcement, extra motivation and

increased personal engagement. We all know that, as individuals we can go faster but in a team, we certainly can go further. Believe me when I say that this forms the very basis of work in our present times. The days are relatively speaking behind us when individuals awaited their eureka moment. Today that moment is collective.

I would strongly suggest you hang on to all the positives that have arisen from your participation in the InnovED Project, but more particularly the last one. We have come to a point in our education process where we cannot operate as self-centred learners. It is definitely more gainful for you to actively engage in a collective manner in your studies. Peer support and peer sharing are priceless values that must be both

encouraged and safeguarded and I expect all teachers to actively encourage this kind of cooperative learning for learners to achieve their learning goals.

Ladies and Gentlemen, before I conclude, let me extend my congratulations to the National Productivity and Competitiveness Council for setting yet another milestone and adding yet another feather to your nest through a smooth and highly successful organisation of this year's edition of InnovED.

I must say I was very positively struck by the highly structured lead-up to today's Award Ceremony. I especially like the idea of appointing a School Innovation Champion responsible for establishing a smooth interaction between the school and the NPCC, the participation in an online quiz, the appointment of Subject Experts for the theme-wise assessment of the participating teams, the extra coaching undertaken during the Creation and the final team presentation before a Jury Panel.
