## Question of : ADDRESSING THE CHALLENGES OF FORCED DISPLACEMENT OF REFUGEES

The General Assembly,

<u>Deeply disturbed</u> by the fact that a large proportion of displaced refugees is subject to human trafficking, a modern-day slavery that dehumanises and commodifies human beings, denying them of basic rights,

<u>Recognizing</u> the urgent need for a comprehensive and coordinated response to the increasing number of forcibly displaced humans worldwide, because of conflicts, persecution, violence and human rights response,

<u>Bearing in mind</u> that 114 million refugees have already been forcefully displaced as of September 2023, and that the United Nations High Commission on Refugees (UNHCR) projects that there will be more than 130 million people facing such issues in 2024,

<u>Underlining</u> the risk that violations of the international law could lead to a new conflict that none of the parties or the region can afford,

Insisting that it is in the interest of every member to respect the law,

<u>Convinced</u> that a sustainable conflict resolution can only be found through dialogue, diplomacy, and negotiations in a spirit of goodwill and in line with international law,

<u>Insisting</u> that all agreements taken today, in favor or not to a country, must be respected with meticulous care in the order to assure peace, stability,

- 1. <u>Calls</u> for a global mobilization and humanitarian upholding;
- 2. <u>Urges</u> the countries to depoliticize the humanitarian aid attributed to refugees;

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3. <u>Encourages</u> the dissolution of political oppression, poverty and continued war in order to prevent further casualties and humanitarian aid crisis;

- 4. <u>Expresses its appreciation</u> for the recognition of the June 20<sup>th</sup> as the International Refugee Day, and the unflinching efforts of the UNHCR for mitigating the refugee crisis;
- 5. <u>Notes with interest</u> that ending statelessness is an effective means of addressing one particular root cause of conflict and forced displacement, which UNHCR is pursuing;
- 6. <u>Notes with approval</u> the reforms to nationality laws and further accessions to the Statelessness Conventions.
- 7. <u>Highly encourages</u> social integration between refugees and the host community through community-based programs, cultural exchanges and language training, furthering thereof cultural integration;
- 8. <u>Requests</u> member states to promote solidarity and burden sharing through the equitable distribution of responsibilities, resources and resettlement opportunities;
- 9. <u>Supports</u> regional organizations in facilitating voluntary repatriation, local integration and resettlement of refugees;
- 10. <u>Stresses</u> that monitoring internal displacement can help forecast potential later displacement across international borders;
- 11. Solemnly affirms that early responses to internal displacement can mitigate the risk of upheaval and impoverishment from the outset;
- 12. <u>Designates</u> education and awareness campaigns to increase public understanding of the refugee experience, promoting empathy and solidarity towards refugees regardless of their home country;

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13. <u>Encourages</u> partnerships between governments, international organizations, the private and expertise in support to mobilize resources and expertise in support of refugees;

14. <u>Requests</u> member states to find means in a bid to enhance income distribution and employment rate to enhance living standards.
