QUESTION OF: ADDRESSING THE PROBLEMS CAUSED BY CHANGING POPULATION STRUCTURE RESULTING FROM INTERNATIONAL MIGRATION AND POPULATION AGEING.

The General Assembly,

<u>Underlining</u> the fact that the influx of illegal migrants may be transmitters of communicable diseases since no check-up is carried out before entering the country,

<u>Fully aware</u> of the fact that a high rate of international migration (whether illegal or not) results in unevenness in the demography of a country, subsequently destabilizing the country's potential workforce,

<u>Concerned</u> by the gradual reduction of birth rate over time due to low fertility rate and mass migration,

<u>Observing</u> that a growing ageing population also increases the demand in healthcare services and retirement welfare causing tax burden on the labour force,

<u>Keeping in mind</u> that an ageing population arises the need for more goods and services for elder people and this requires more money allocation by the government,

<u>Noting with regret</u> the increasing number of potential labour force leaving their country of origin due to the thin prospects of employment,

1. <u>Insists</u> that laws should be enforced condemning illegal crossing of borders;

2. <u>Accepts</u> that there should be a thorough background check of migrants at airports and borders to know where they come from as well as their past records;

3. <u>Further requests</u> the collection and analysis of demographic data through regular surveys so as to ensure better control and knowledge over population structure;

4. <u>Calls on</u> the need for free integration programs for migrants which will educate them about their host country's culture so as to facilitate integration process;

5. <u>Demands</u> the need of investing more in the creation of interesting jobs for the young as an incentive to encourage them to stay back;

6. <u>Emphasizes</u> the need of free education and easier access to tertiary level education through the grants of scholarships;

7. <u>Considers</u> that there should be family planning schemes to educate people about the demography of the country and the optimum family structure to adopt;

8. <u>Suggests</u> that retirement ages should be raised so as to enlighten tax burden on workforce;

9. <u>Requests</u> that with the help of WHO, there should be healthcare programs and sensitizing campaigns to promote a healthy lifestyle;

10. <u>Endorses</u> that well-funded programs and government support in setting up more senior's fitness centers, may help reduce health care costs of ageing population;

11. <u>Recommends</u> the implementation of proactive steps such as welcoming young and skilled immigrants to decrease demographic imbalance and increase labour productivity,
